


Why talk about race?

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



<u>Unemployment rates</u> in Michigan for the two largest communities of color, <u>African Americans and Hispanics</u>, have been disproportionately higher, sometimes <u>double</u>, in comparison to their white counterparts for at least the last 10 years. In 2011, <u>African Americans</u> had an <u>unemployment rate</u> of 20.1%, <u>Hispanics</u> of 10.7%, and <u>whites</u> of 8.9%. Michigan currently ranks <u>2nd highest in African American unemployment</u> among the 50 states.


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PLACES not faces

For our communities to thrive and succeed, we need ample job opportunities in Michigan that allow our children and families to have the quality of life we all deserve no matter what race you are. This has not been the case for many years in Michigan. In some cities, for every job opening there are 10 people seeking employment. This makes it difficult for our communities to prosper and <u>unevenly impacts our communities of color. We can do</u> better by making sure that we create more jobs in the places that need it the most.

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



Health barriers / disparities statements. Use two steps:

- Step One Universal statement
 - All children regardless of their race or ethnicity should have access to the health care they need to be healthy (75% Strongly agree. 18% Somewhat agree)
 - All people should have equal access to a basic level of quality health care (62% Strongly agree, 26% Somewhat agree)
 - Every person has a right to be healthy (74% Stronglyagree, 11%
 - Everyone should have access to the health care they need to be healthy (60% Stronglyagree. 25% Somewhat agree)
 - Today, too many Oregonians face barriers to adequate health care. Our health care system should help everyone get the care they need. (49% Strongly agree. 24% Somewhat agree)

Health barriers / disparities statements. Use two steps:

- Step Two Call out barriers
 - Today, too many Oregonians face barriers to adequate health care. Our health care system should help everyone get the care they need. (49% Strongly agree, 24% Somewhat agree)
 - All people living in Oregon, regardless of citizenship status, deserve access to a basic level of quality health care. (36% Strongly agree, 30% Somewhat agree)
 - We know that today in Oregon, being born in a rural area can create barriers to a healthy life. We need to reduce the barriers faced by rural Oregonians to getting and staying healthy. (45% Strongly agree, 33% Somewhat agree)
