


The public's desire for tax cuts can be hard to measure. Pollsters asking what should be done with the nation's budget surplus got different results depending on the specifics of the question.

... Should the money be used for a tax cut, or should it be spent on programs for education, the environment, health care, crime-fighting and military defense?





A Wilderness Legacy

When Spanish settlers first arrived in New Mexico four hundred years ago, they described rolling hills of auburn grass and cacti that came up to the stirrups of mounted horsemen. Later, Aldo Leopold, "the father of Wilderness", wrote of this land of unparalleled biological diversity that the "...oak-dotted hills, ...pine clad mesas, and lazy trout streams ...come near to being the cream of creation."

Sadly, today most of the rolling grasses are gone, the streams have long dried up, and many of the speckled mesas and hills have been sacrificed to economic development and motorized recreation. These lands, once treasured as some of the wildest in the west, are quickly dwindling.


Wilderness Protection is the Answer





The Gettysburg Address

Four score and seven years ago our fathers <u>brought forth</u>, on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and <u>dedicated</u> to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so <u>conceived</u> and so <u>dedicated</u>, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to <u>dedicate</u> a portion of that field, as a <u>final resting place</u> for those who here <u>gave their lives</u> that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate—we can not consecrate—we can not hallow—this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion—that cause for which they here gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a <a href="measure-measur


Metaphors trump facts




